Equalities Act 2010	•
Schools must have regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, promote equality of opportunity and foster good relations between disabled and non-disabled children and young people when carrying out their functions.	
Schools must publish information to demonstrate their compliance with this general duty and must prepare and publish objectives to achieve the core aims of the general duty. Objectives must be specific and measurable.	
The information must also include information about the arrangements for the admission of disabled pupils, the steps taken to prevent disabled pupils from being treated less favourably than other pupils, the facilities provided to assist access for disabled pupils and the schools' accessibility plans.	

Supporting children with medical needs		
The school's governing body must ensure that arrangements are in place in schools to support pupils at school with medical conditions		
Supporting Children Looked After		
All schools and academies and free schools must appoint a Designated Teacher for looked after children.		
Where a looked after child is being assessed for SEN it is vital to take account of information set out in the Care Plan. SEN professionals must work closely with other relevant professionals involved in the child's life as a consequence of his/her being looked after.		
These include the social worker, Designated Doctor or Nurse, Independent Reviewing Officer (IRO), VSH and Designated Teacher in school.		

SEN information	
All schools must publish details of what SEN provision is available through the SEN information report	
Schools must inform parents and young people if SEN provision is made for them.	

The Local Offer

Schools **must** publish detailed information about their arrangements for identifying, assessing and making provision for pupils with **SEN**. The school-specific information should relate to the schools' arrangements for providing a graduated response to children's SEN.

Other school musts:	Tick
Schools must use their best endeavours to make sure that a child with SEN gets the support they need – this means doing everything they can to meet children and young people's SEN	
Schools must ensure that children and young people with SEN engage in the activities of the school alongside pupils who do not have SEN	
Schools must designate a teacher to be responsible for co-ordinating SEN provision – the SEN co-ordinator, or SENCO. (This does not apply to 16 to 19 academies.)	
Schools must inform parents when they are making special educational provision for a child	
Schools must co-operate with the local authority in the EHC plan review process and, as part of the review, the local authority can require schools to convene and hold annual review meetings on its behalf.	
Governing bodies must ensure that there is a qualified teacher designated as SENCO for the school. The SENCO must be a qualified teacher working at the school. A newly appointed SENCO must be a qualified teacher and, where they have not previously been the SENCO at that or any other relevant school for a total period of more than twelve months, they must achieve a National Award in Special Educational Needs Co-ordination within three years of appointment.	
Schools must ensure that, subject to certain conditions, pupils with SEN engage in the activities of the nursery or school together with those who do not have SEN, and are encouraged to participate fully in the life of the nursery or school and in any wider community activity.	
The School Admissions Code of Practice requires children and young people with SEN to be treated fairly. Admissions authorities:	
 must consider applications from parents of children who have SEN but do not have an EHC plan on the basis of the school's published admissions criteria as part of normal admissions procedures must not refuse to admit a child who has SEN but does not have an EHC plan because they do not feel able to cater for those needs 	
must not refuse to admit a child on the grounds that they do not have an EHC plan
